

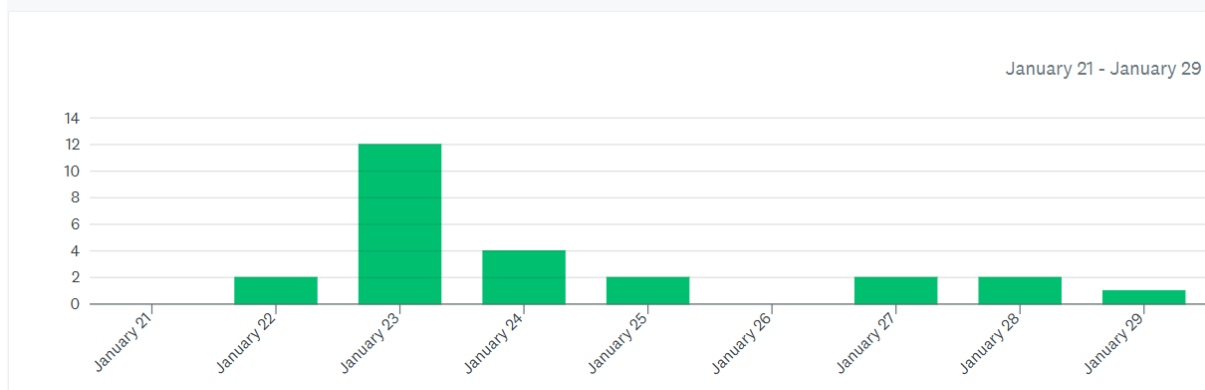
Responses to Brudenell Drive Green Survey

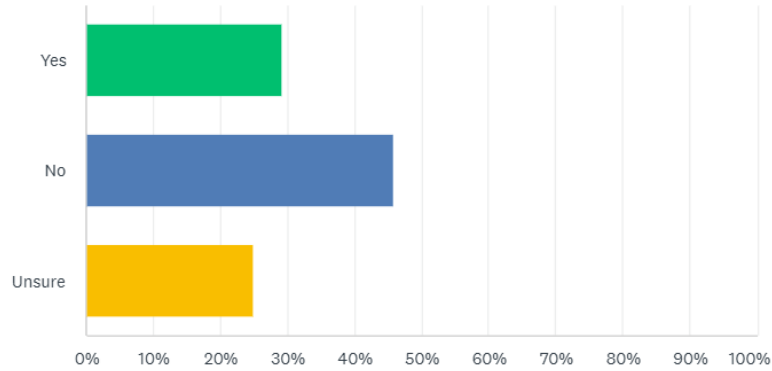

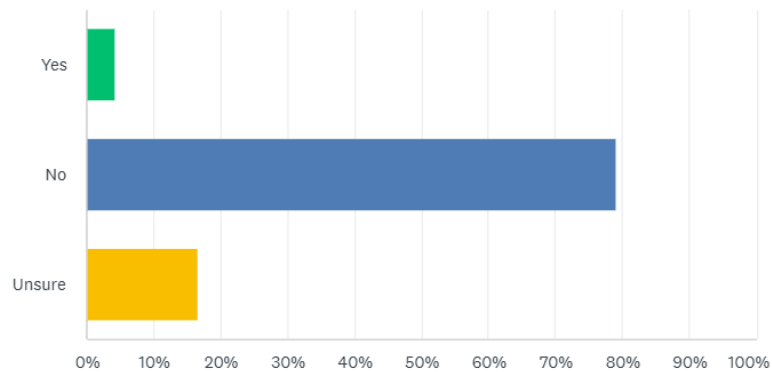

Comments received via survey

<p>A hedge for wildlife - there is a lack of hedgerows in the village. Fruit trees - apple or crab apple. Community bird feeders? Could the local primary school be involved somehow.</p>
<p>A memorial to stoke mandeville ! To the village it USED to be So our children can see what a pleasant village it once was</p>
<p>A mix of wild flowers and formal planting with some benches</p>
<p>An area to promote biodiversity and wellness with plants, quirky wood carvings and seating</p>
<p>Formal flower beds to brighten up the village. The one on the green makes a difference but it's so small.</p>
<p>The land was purchased by the PC to prevent future development on it, so it would seem strange to then develop it itself. Is the PC sure that the area will never need to be completely dug up for drainage access, as happened in the last couple of years? Putting the war memorial there is baffling, given that a better site, now with planning permission, already exists. Benches? Got dozens of them, and they're almost never used. If the PC is desperate to be seen to be doing something with it, then what about some low maintenance fruit trees by way of a community orchard?</p>
<p>I would like it to remain as it is. When grassed areas are cut, anything new would be covered with cuttings from mowers resulting in additional expense to maintain. I would much rather see any additional monies spent on the quantity and quality of grass cuts a year as at time these areas resemble a field.</p>
<p>We would be proud to have a war memorial installed to the right facing towards the right of Risborough Road of street light No.1. Planting scented and wild flowers around the memorial would be very good. The target green area could be left with the rope fencing all the way along to see how the initial transformation works. A pot to put flowers in may be good.</p>
<p>I think a war memorial would help identify this as the village centre. Or an identification board similar to the one in Wendover outside the Chemist shop with some info about the old church and cemetery. I like the idea of a wild flower meadow</p>
<p>Await the completion of the SM relief road and result closure of Risborough Road . The current fencing of the Green is appreciated and stay as it is. Any prospect of parking on the Green would put at risk new and recent drainage which has prevented past flooding . The PC should address the question of the purchase of the Green in front of the school from the Highways Authority for a central village Green</p>
